## Encouraging remembrance of a church, a pastor and associate pastor that Encouraged new missionaries

- a Church -10<sup>th</sup> & Ontario Alliance Church, Vancouver
- pastor – Willis & Florence Brooks

Don Dirks says: These days I have a new habit. Whenever I have some slack time, I am downsizing and trying to eliminate the accumulation of "things," stuff that I can't take to heaven with me. I don't know if I am making progress but I keep trying. So, a few days ago I came across a printed page that had the name Brooks in my handwriting at the top of the page. So, I sat down to read it. It was written by Garth Hunt to describe his last visit with Mr. Brooks. That reading touched my heart and jogged my memory so I went to my computer and wrote these lines.



The year was 1959 in late June. Elma and I were spending a few weeks with my parents in Chilliwack, BC. In a few days we would be saying goodbye to them and leaving home to begin our missionary journey.

One day Rev. Willis Brooks called me to ask when we were leaving for Africa. When I told him the date that we would be taking the train for New York he quickly responded. "Then you must come to my church in Vancouver (The 10th and Ontario St. Alliance) to share your testimony and calling." He concluded by giving me an invitation for the following Wednesday evening, for the weekly Bible Study and prayer meeting time.

At that meeting I was given the full time to share God's leading in our lives and the burden of our hearts to go and share the deathless story of redeeming love in Jesus Christ. To close that service, he proceeded to mark that hour with a commissioning prayer but he also had a word from the Lord. He quoted John 5:35: [Jesus] speaking of John the Baptist "**He was a burning and shining light.**"

As Elma and I stood before the congregation, several prayers were offered as many laid their hands on us and then Pastor Brooks commissioned us, with prayer to go in His Name and to be a burning and shining light in Gabon.



Fast forward the tape. About three months later, Elma and I had been in Paris since mid-July and were already deeply entrenched in our French language study program. Then one day our telephone rang. I immediately recognized the voice, it was Mr. Brooks and it sounded like he was in the room next door.

Imagine my surprise when he shared that he and his wife were in Paris and were lodged in the luxurious Hotel du Louvre in downtown Paris. Then he asked if Elma and I could accept an invitation to come that evening to have dinner with them in the outdoor restaurant at their firstclass hotel. We were delighted to accept the invitation.

Surprise. During that dinner (French cuisine is some of the best in the world) they shared a fascinating story with us. They were on a world Tour offered to them as a gift from their church which they had started and pastored for over 20 years. This was their first stop. And we got in on it. (photo - The Hotel Louvre restaurant today)

As they gave us more details which they were obviously excited to share, we were caught up in the narrative as we enjoyed the delicious meal. They told us how the church Board had come to them to propose that they should make a tour of the world and visit missionaries as they travelled. But they were reluctant to accept such a gift mainly because the church was into a big building program and their church had a large annual budget for Missions giving for that year. They felt that the church could not afford to fund a special project like the one that was being proposed.

Eventually the church Board came up with a plan: they would propose this plan to the congregation and ask them to donate as they were able but not to neglect the building Budget or the annual Missions budget. When the plan was exposed to the pastoral family, they agreed that the Board could proceed but with one condition. If when the time came to leave on this world Tour, if there was a shortage in the building budget or in the missions giving the trip would be called off and the monies added as and where needed. So, the project was launched and detailed travel plans were made.

Another surprise. Remember we are still enjoying a multi course meal in a sidewalk restaurant on a warm summer evening somewhere in the heart of Paris.

As the story unfolds, the Vancouver Alliance Church had become a significant church in the city. One day a pastoral letter was written to the shut-in members of the church. That letter included a kindly expression from the writing pastor that said: "We do **not** expect you to support the church." But in the process of typing that letter a typographic error was made: the letter that was sent out actually said: "We **do** expect you to support the church."

One of the dear saints of the church received that letter and became convicted that she had not been doing her part to support the church. So, she called her Counsel and instructed him to change the wording of her Last Will and Testament to include a bequest of her entire estate to the Alliance church of which she was a member.

As the date for the Brooks Tour drew near all the funds received were carefully counted and all three funds were solidly in the black. The Brooks could leave knowing that the building program and the funds for Missions were adequate. To coincide with that event just in time, a letter came from a lawyer to share that a Bequest had been left to the church and was ready to be paid. The church should indicate where the payment could be made.

When the letter was read with care, the amount of the Estate came to exactly the same amount as what the Board had set as a Budget for the Brooks World Tour, plus \$30 dollars. At that point in the story Mrs. Brooks opened her purse and took out an envelope and handed it to Elma. When Elma had opened the envelope there was a sum of \$30.00 which she said that she and her husband wanted to donate for our soon to be born baby. Elma was one month away from giving birth to our son Robin.

Enter the Fowlers. Gordon was at that time serving as the Associate pastor of the 10<sup>th</sup> and Ontario St. Alliance Church, and was an experienced leader and capable to assume the leadership of the church temporarily. Gordon and Eleanor were there in person to enjoy this experience. But they helped make that tour possible by caring for the Brook's children during the three months that they were gone.

Fast forward again: In 2007, I attended a celebration in the 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue Alliance Church in memory of 70 years since Rev Brooks started his ministry as lead pastor of the Vancouver Alliance Church.

At the close of the ceremony, I walked to the front of the church to where Mr. Brooks was seated on the front row. I sat down beside him and asked him if he remembered me. He nodded and then he spoke my name without a moment's hesitation. So, I asked him, do you remember the message that you gave Elma and me as we were leaving for Africa. He said that he could not remember so I shared with him the words of commission and prayer that he had made. With that, tears came into his eyes and he thanked me whole heartedly for reminding him. I thanked him for his investment in my life.

".as for me, my contentment is not in wealth but in seeing you and knowing all is well between us. And when I awake in heaven, I will be fully satisfied, for I will see you face to face." Psalm 17:15 (LB)

**This is the article written by Garth Hunt:**

They said, “She’s just a new believer”. Willis’ response was “Hey, I’m not looking for an old one! I’m quite happy with a new believer becoming my wife.”

Three days before he passed away, I had my last visit with my dear friend. His son, Alyn, wasn’t sure if Mr. Brooks would know me or how the visit would go. Let me tell you about my last moments with him. I asked, “Do you know me?” He blurted out, “Sure—you’re Garth Hunt.” That’s all he said.

I sat in quietness for a few moments, then asked him. “Have you been watching any hockey?” Again, he said, “sure”.

I waited again, then said, “One of these days you’re going to see Mrs. Brooks, your old friend Mr. Skitch, and so many of your friends.” He nodded.

Then I read a couple of Scripture verses to him. He said, “Pray.” At the end of my prayer he said, “Praise the Lord.”

Then I got up to leave, and told him. “You and Mrs. Brooks are ‘the true nobility’ (Luke 9:41 LB). You have had a great ministry. You have influenced so many of us. You are my hero!”

He leaned forward a bit and with deep intensity said, “No, no. I am nothing, nothing.”

I said, “You became nothing so that Christ could become everything. You held Him high for everyone to see. We are all indebted to you.”

All this time I was holding his hand. Now I moved toward the bedroom door and through my tears said, “Goodbye Mr. Brooks”.

He lifted his arm and said, “One minute”. I returned to the side of his bed and then he began quoting Scripture:

*“Bless the Lord oh my soul and all that is within me. Bless His Holy name. Bless the Lord O my soul and forget not all his benefits.”*

He continued to quote most of the 103<sup>rd</sup> Psalm.

I said, “You have a great memory”.

He replied, “Not as good as it used to be,” and then I said goodbye again.

Mr. Brooks was truly a remarkable man! He was a pioneer, a church planter, a preacher, a teacher, a radio broadcaster, a film producer, a missionary pastor, and a world traveler. But more than anything, he was a man of God who cared for people.

## **Ernest Regier *March 5, 1930 - October 22, 2022***

We celebrate the life lived by Reverend David Ernest Regier,

Ernest was married to Helen Regier (nee Dahl) who predeceased him in 2009. He is survived by his three children: Marlon, Lowell, and Sheri and their families.

Ernest Regier was born March 5, 1930 south of Swift Current SK, the third child of eight born to Mennonite farmers.

Hard work was a given on the Regier's small farm, especially during the Great Depression years. Ernest loved working and was soon admired for his ability to analyze mechanical and logistical challenges on the farm and invent creative solutions.

It is with amazement and admiration how he applied those skills later in life, with house and church construction and a myriad of other ways in which he supported his family and church

community.

Ernest came to faith in Christ at Bible Camp in his teens. That step impacted the rest of his life, both personally and professionally. In the 1940s he attended both Swift Current Bible Instituted and Grace College of the Bible in Omaha, Nebraska. During that time, he sensed a call to pastoral ministry.

In 1957 the district superintendent of the C&MA asked Ernest, then living back in Swift Current to support a small group of people wanting to start a new Alliance Church in Shaunavon Sk. He initially took up that leadership role part time (doing the farming on the side). Soon the Shaunavon congregation realized the ministry needed his full-time attention, so began 40 years of pastoral ministry.

Ernest soon met a sparkly, quick-witted gal named Helen Dahl. She caught his attention and they married October 8, 1960. That began a lifelong partnership in home and ministry.

In 1965, Ernest and Helen answered a call to help launch a second church congregation in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan. Thirteen years in PA were full and productive. During the summer of 1966, Doug Wiebe, Betty (Stewart) Kerr and Lois (Downey) Westerlund were a great encouragement to the Regiers in assisting this new congregation. August 19, 1967, Ernest performed his first (ecumenical) wedding in a Presbyterian Church with United Church people, he being an Alliance Pastor. This was the wedding of Wayne & Betty Kerr.

Two more church plants were in Ernest's future. The next one was in 1978, when the family moved to Saskatoon to start what became the Lawson Heights Alliance Church. Then in 1986, the Regiers crossed the Saskatchewan River on the east side of Saskatoon to plant the Erindale Alliance Church.

As a pastor, Ernest was much loved. His humility and pragmatic leadership (combined with his down-to-earth sense of humour) helped to nurture strong and growing congregations.

In the 1980s and 1990s, the 3 Regier children left home for university and start families of their own. Grandpa Ernest was forever inventing some new toy or gadget with which to entertain his grandchildren.

In 1997 Ernest officially retired from full-time ministry, yet continued to provide pastoral support to the congregation in various ways at Erindale. In the early 2000s he shifted his ministry attention to focus on caring for Helen who had developed cancer. His humble devotion to her was an inspiration. Helen passed in 2009.

Ernest remained engaged in church and family life following Helen's death. In 2019, Ernest experienced a fall that marked a significant change in his cognitive capacity necessitating his move to Circle Drive Special Care Home. Though his mental condition deteriorated quickly he was able to find words for prayer to the very end of his life. He graduated to glory October 22, 2022 with his three children present.

At the memorial service, DS Bernie Van de Walle expressed the significant church planter role of Ernest that is rarely seen. We thank Ernest for modelling a true pastoral heart that is an example to be passed on to the next generation and all who will follow.

### WHY IS GAF IMPORTANT?

The **Global Advance Fund (GAF)** enables all the work of the Alliance.

A *Ministry Partner Fund* supports specific projects by an IW.

A *GAF Partner Fund* supports the living costs of an IW (car, local clothing requirements, etc.).

Other approved special funds may be set up for a group of IWs. Compensation is from GAF.


GAF also supports the infrastructure of managing a denomination. Less than 6.3% of the GAF budget goes to administration. That means all of the NMC staff and leadership, New Ventures, Envision, Indigenous Ministries, Networks (Chaplains, CCACA, etc.) Justice & Compassion and Defend Dignity are supported by a small portion of GAF.

Funds such as Jaffray are specific for an initiative such as the South Asia project right now. That is a directive fund and does not share any part with GAF, just like directive donations to a local church.

### WHAT CAN BE DONE WHILE ASSURING GAF CONTINUES FOREVER?

The **Alliance Charitable Foundation (ACF)** offers a unique opportunity for you to steward your finances wisely today, while ensuring that the work of The Alliance Canada continues for generations to come - until all have heard the Good News.

The ACF's wise combination of Foundation giving, life insurance and regular monthly annuity payouts offers a unique opportunity for you to provide long-lasting support to the work of the Alliance in Canada, while offsetting unexpected expenses for **the rest of your life**. 

- **Six percent were over 80.**

**To sum this up, over 64% of these leaders had their greatest impact and achievement when they were over 60. What does this mean for you? I want to both challenge and encourage you to focus on Philippians 4:13: I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.**

**This is not age restrictive. It is not health restrictive. It is not financially restrictive. It is not position restrictive.**

**Lastly, I believe that if we truly ask God to use us in ways which we cannot even fathom, He will. I believe He wants to.....**






